How a Man Crumbled is theatrical genius

Jacques LeCoq's physical theatre is not everyone's cup of tea, but Clout Theatres, *How a Man Crumbled* is so good it could convert even those most resistant to Lecoq's grotesque buffoonery. Utilizing many devices from the silent era of cinema including subtitles and tableaux, *How a Man Crumbled* loosely revolves around a writer trying to dispose of a corpse. Throw in some lethal leeks and a smidgen of sexual depravity and the end result is a marvelous, engaging and engrossing piece of physical theatre that truly deserves to be seen.

How a Man Crumbled runs daily at Summerhall until August 26th (apart from the 17th and 18th). Doors open at 3.30 p.m. Admission is £10.00

Sineglossa's Remember Me relies too heavily on its single trick
